Leave No Neighbor Behind

Restores focus back to council – transition from Surge 4 Service → Faith In Action – fraternity

Knights of Columbus are called to step into the breach and leave no neighbor behind – especially in this time of crisis. As the coronavirus pandemic continues, our duty is to lead our families, protect our parishes, and serve our communities, remembering always that where there is a need, there is a Knight. Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson has challenged Knights to take this moment as an opportunity to "deepen our commitment to the very principles which define us: charity, unity and fraternity." Knights of Columbus Order wide are encouraged to serve and sacrifice for those around us. Many, including in our own councils and parishes, are isolated and alone in quarantine. Food banks, blood centers, and other essential services have been depleted of their vital supplies. There are many people and places that require urgent help.

Knights are encouraged to engage in five types of service activities:

- 1. Support Your Brother Knights
- 2. Support Your Parish
- 3. Support Your Community
- 4. Feed the Hungry
- 5. Participate in Blood Drives

Support Your Brother Knights and their Families

No council should leave a Brother Knight or his family behind. Through tools including phone trees and daily check-ins, your council can make sure that every Knight and his family has the essentials he needs, fulfilling the vision of charity and unity upon which Blessed Father McGivney founded our Order. Contact your Field Agent if necessary. As we transition in the Faith in Action initiative, this is one way to restore charitable focus to your council

Support Your Parish and Pastor

In this unprecedented time, your pastor has lost his traditional methods of charitable and evangelical outreach. He needs help to fulfill the Church's mission. Councils must reinforce their pastor and show that Knights stand ready to support him and parish community, ensuring that no member of the parish is forgotten or goes hungry. Help the Pastor and office staff reopen the church. Offer to clean and sanitize the church. Welcome back parishioners. If required, take their temperatures and usher them in and out of their seats. Remind the Pastor that we are the strong right arm of the Church and that we are here to help.

Support Your Community

As a result of quarantine measure, many find themselves cut off and isolated – especially those without family and community support systems. Some needs may be physical, while others are social, emotional, or spiritual. Whatever the need, councils are encouraged to assess and creatively support their broader community. Offer to mow the lawn, cleanup their properties or complete light projects.

Feed the Hungry

Since its founding, the Knights of Columbus has donated millions of pounds of food in the effort to end hunger. Now, more than ever, many are unable to provide adequate food for their families. Knights can donate to, and assist with, distribution at local food pantries and food banks so no one in their community goes to bed hungry at night. If your foodbanks are adequately staffed, or they have sufficient supplies, then create your own food collection program. Reverse Trick-or-Treat or a box with a sign out by the mailbox. **The Idaho State KofC Council is sponsoring a Challenge** –

the 1st council to donate 5000 lbs. of food or \$500 to their local foodbank, the State will then credit back an additional \$200 to the foodbank.

Participate in Blood Drives

Since 1938, Knights of Columbus have mobilized blood donation campaigns on the local, state, and national levels, supporting and saving countless lives. As the Red Cross issues emergency calls for donations, those who are not already isolated due to illness, age or underlying conditions are encouraged to donate blood. Knights can once again lead the charge to give the gift of life. If you are unable to host a Blood Drive – attend an existing one, or better yet assist or donate yourself.

 - Some of the best are our wives and teens

Family

- Grow council FAITH and FAMILY programing within parish
- Engage your members and their families
 - Family centric programs and activities
 - Recruiting when sharing council story have it come from the family, wife and kids
 - Our wives are some of our best recruiters
- Be more inclusive appeal to:
 - Wives and kids
 - Youth and families
