## No Neighbor Left Behind

The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic fraternal order dedicated to putting charity and community first. So when the COVID-19 epidemic hit and the resulting economic impacts started putting people out of work, Knights across the state of Idaho responded with charity.



In Buhl, that meant Council 2685 purchased a beef cow, cut it up and provided it to the Parish Office, where the beef is being distributed to those in need.

"We were looking for ways to help our families – a lot of our families were out of jobs," said Ron Anthony, Grand Knight for Council 2685. One of the brothers of that council owns a feed lot and, with the price of beef depressed, he made the council a good deal on a cow.

"We purchased it, slaughtered it and took to another knight, where we cut it up," said Anthony. "We let it hang for 10-15 days, then four members cut it and wrapped it, froze it and took it to the parish office, where they've been giving it out to families in need."

Anthony said nine Knights contributed to the process: Anthony, John Avila, Tony Avelar, Zack Avelar, Michael Guzman, Dario Leija, Conception Loa, Israel Prada and Scott Tverdy.

"We ground almost 350 pounds of hamburger, but we didn't just cut it up for hamburger," said Anthony. "We had about 1,100 pounds hanging. My father ran a meat packing plant when I was growing up. After I finished about 8 hours on the butcher floor, which I hadn't done in about 40 years, I thought, 'There's a reason I haven't done it since,' " he said with a laugh.

Anthony said the council originally budgeted \$1,500 to buy the cow and process it, "but it was so big, it came in at \$1,650." He said about half the beef has been distributed to the needy already.

Knights at St. Piux X Council in Coeur d'Alene have also been helping feed the hungry in their community. According to Grand Knight Tom Tintinger, the parish there has a food pantry delivery crew that goes out each morning to pick up donated food from a local super market, and then delivers it to the St. Pius and St. Vincent DePaul food pantries in Couer d'Alene. When there is abundance, they also share food with the Second Street Commons and Union Gospel Mission.

In Pocatello, Knights serve on the St. Vincent DePaul board of directors, volunteer at the SVDP thrift store, and provide financial support to the food bank. They have also branched out to holding a voter registration drive, donated money to purchase thermometers for the church school, and have been instrumental in enforcing the post-COVID entry requirements into Mass, taking temperatures, asking health questions and making sure parishioners were wearing masks, according to Keith Riemersma of the Pocatello Council.

"The No Neighbor Left behind Program is designed to reach out to our fellow brothers, Catholics, and even neighbors to make sure they are all getting food and blood in this time of need," said Roy Bartholomay, State Deputy for the Knights of Columbus. "We're promoting this throughout the state." Bartholomay said Meridian Council 11548 has been helping staff their food bank and Risen Christ council 12854 has grown a garden that produces food for the needy, and the St. George Council in Post Falls has donated over 24,000 pounds of food and \$1,000 to their local food bank since the pandemic started.

"Charity has been at the heart of the work of the Knights, and it always will be," said Bartholomay. "Now, during these difficult times, Knights are really stepping forward to meet the needs of our communities. We encourage all Catholic men to join us in serving our communities."

### 4th Degree Exemplification - Meridian

Faithful Navigator Chuck Boisvert of Bishop Sylvester W Treinen #2751, held a Knighting ceremony in the church parking lot at Holy Apostles, Meridian, for five new members that completed their Exemplification on line earlier in the week. Sir Knights Carlos Bendeck, Paul Edwards, John Paul Grande, Zachary Hussey, and James Pavelek, were Knighted. "Its not ideal, as we like to have a Mass, nice ceremony and dinner for new members, but we have to continue to let Brothers complete their degree even during these difficult times," commented FN Boisvert. These new Idaho members joined a large group from Oregon in the Zoom ceremony. "We hope to have a celebration dinner, with spouses, when the church opens up to such events in the future, and get the entire Color Corps involved to welcome all new members to our Assembly," stated Color Corps Commander, Joe Cardona.



<u>Soccer Challenge</u> – your council event should held be in September or October. Final district results are due to me by the end of October to be considered for state and national awards. Now is the time to start planning using the resources available on the supreme web site and get your venue established. Talk to your Catholic school PE teacher about including the soccer challenge in their curriculum. With some creative ideas you can make this a really fun event for our youth.

<u>Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest</u> – the theme for this year's essay contest is: "Discuss how trusting in God during a difficult time has helped you or someone you know find the strength and hope to endure it." This is a very timely subject and can help our youth realize that God can help them through difficult times such as these. Essays should be prepared in October and November. Final district results are due to me at the end of November to be considered for state and national awards.
